Dear Sir:-

Your letter of recent date to Louise Olivereau is being returned at my suggestion on account of the fact that neither she nor we care for your political views or opinions.

There are certain rules governing the correspondence of prisoners which you will have to conform to. Furthermore, it will not be necessary for you to send anyone to see Miss Olivereau, as she is getting along very well and doing good work in her chosen profession in this institution. Nobody but known personal friends or relatives are allowed to visit prisoners at this institution. Miss Olivereau knows best who she wants to visit her, without any suggestions from you.

About the only objection Miss Olivereau can find to this place is that she has not been abused as she had anticipated and hoped for. We are not making martyrs at this institution, and there is nothing she needs, as she gets quite as much food as the average middle-class citizen on the outside, and better in quality. She also has a good, warm, airy place to stay.

This will be notice to you that your correspondence with this woman must stop.
