WEEK'S WAGES OF HARD-WORKING HUSBAND HARDLY REACHES ANY MORE

WANT TO KNOW WHY THIS IS SO

WOMAN SUFFRAGE PARTY WILL HAVE ENGLISHWOMAN ON HAND TO ROAST THE TRUSTS—WOMEN WILL MEET IN RIDGEWOOD TIMES ASSEMBLY ROOMS

If it depends upon the housewives of Greater Ridgewood, the High Cost of Living problem will be smashed into a thousand bits on Monday evening, when the women get together to discuss and study and attack this all-important household question.

Everybody knows that the average householder of our section, like every other section, has an immense problem staring her in the face from week to week. Expenses have increased in her household, but in many cases her husband's wages have not kept pace with this increased expense. Eggs, for instance, are sky high in price, as if the chickens were laying the eggs up in the clouds now instead of in the barn or chicken coop. Butter is a close second and sells at a price that would make one think that the average cow is being fed on selected clover, instead of the ordinary grass; and meats!—well, let's forget it, or else we will get a headache thinking of the prices.

Why should this be so? That's what the woman with a big household wants

to know! Why should she be expected to keep on paying these extortionate prices when her husband doesn't get an increase in pay.

At the annual assembly convention of the Third Assembly District of the Woman's Suffrage Party, which will be held on Monday afternoon, this question will be brought up for discussion.

"It will be a pity," said Mrs. Eva Eno, chairman of the Queens County Suffrage Party, "if every single woman in Greater Ridgewood, who has this problem before her to solve, does not attend this lecture on the High Cost of Living, which will take place Monday afternoon. The men have not solved this problem for us. Let us women get together; familiarize ourselves with the cause and wherefore of these high prices for the foods we buy, and see if we cannot at least help to find a way out of it."

The convention will be held at the Ridgewood Times Assembly Rooms, Myrtle and Cypress avenues, at three o'clock sharp, Monday afternoon. Delegates to the annual County Convention

will be chosen.

Every woman and young woman is invited to attend and **SHOULD ATTEND**. A highly interesting lecture on the High Cost of Living, Its Causes and How To Eliminate This Problem, will be given by Miss Elizabeth Freeman of England, and George Schubel, the editor of the Ridgewood Times, has also been scheduled to speak.
